

Grades 4-7 planned budgets for an orphanage, learning about saving and wise spending.

Week 2 (09.08.24): Shopping at stores for grades 1-3 enhanced basic calculation skills. Grades 4-7 discussed countries, denominations, and currency conversions using math calculations.

Week 3 (16.08.24): Grades 1-3 explored American, Japanese, and UK currencies. Grades 4-7 related math to nature, forecasting weather, and compared their reports with real-time weather.

Week 4: Grades 1-3 colored shape-made vehicles, while grades 4-7 calculated days on each planet, applying rotation periods and comparing durations.


"Freedom's Call: Reliving the Quit India Movement"
